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Remembering Jim Graver

Our long-time Camera Club of Laguna Woods Village (CCLWV) member and friend, Jim Graver, passed away on February 7th of this year. Jim's smiling face and warm greetings were well known to many of us in the Camera Club. He was a regular in many of our Saddleback Emeritus photography classes in clubhouse 4 as well as a consistent participant in our periodic digital critiques. Jim supported our Club activities in various other ways, too, whether it was teaching a class on macro photography, lending prints for display in the classroom, or volunteering to serve on a committee to recruit new officers for our Board of Directors. Throughout his lengthy illness Jim never lost his sense of humor, his kindness, or his willingness to help others.

Jim's obituary tells his life story quite well, so I will include excerpts here, as many of us are unfamiliar with his early years. "Jim was born on November 6, 1938 to Stanley and Josephine Graver of Bristol, CT. He was raised in the Catholic Church and was active in his younger years as an altar server and boy scout. In high school he developed a passion for photography and soon after enlisted in the U.S. Navy, serving from 1961-1964 as an aerial reconnaissance photographer. After his military service, he moved to California in 1967 and married Diane before putting his roots down in Mission Viejo in 1975. Jim made his career in account management for companies from Anheuser-Busch to Ryder Truck Rental and ARI, where he applied his gifts of genuine care and concern for others towards ensuring the satisfaction of his customers. Far more than his career, however, his life was defined by his hobbies and time given in service to others. Jim is survived by Diane, his wife of 52 years, his son Christopher (and wife Deborah), daughter Catie, grandchildren Erich and Madeleine, a sister, and his beloved nieces and nephews." Jim did have a passion for his hobbies. He was a founding member and the first president of the Orange County Wine Society. He continued in a leadership role in this organization for over 40 years. Jim was best known for making tasty fruit and dessert wines and won the Orange County Fair Home Wine competition, "Best of Show" awards, for fruit wines in 2019 and 2020.



Jim's other hobby was photography; he pursued and shared that interest with most of us as a classmate in an Emeritus photography class, or as an active member of the Camera Club. Jim led the CCLWV educational committee for two years, personally taught several classes - macro photography was his specialty – and wrote articles for the Camaraderie. His images in class often brought "oohs and ahhs" and submissions to our critiques brought many scores of 9 from judges. What I remember best about his participation was that Jim was always willing to serve in whatever capacity was asked of him. For the past two years Jim served on the "search

committee" charged with finding new members to serve on the Board of Directors. This has to be the most difficult committee of all, but Jim, in spite of his illness, stepped forward to serve.





CHANGE YOUR POINT OF VIEW:







The Camera Club - It Takes a Village to Run It

he Camera Club of Laguna Woods Village has been in existence for over 50 years. Throughout those years we have provided Showcases, Digital Critiques, Workshops, Slideshow competition, Annual Awards dinners and Bazaars. It has not been done by just a few individuals but many. I hope to explain just what is and who are involved in the operation of The Camera Club of

First we have the most popular event of the Camera Club: the showcases. We host 13 showcases per year. Each showcase includes a presenter, venue and equipment. These have to be established well in advance.

Then there are Digital Critiques, the learning part of our recurring meetings. Finding judges and venues, collecting and organizing of the images, and submitting the images to the judges, all contribute to a successful critique. Louise Stuart is the Chairperson of this committee with members Mike Bray, Ken Futura and George Harper.

Education is a very important part of our Club's activities. Classes are from

beginner to advanced techniques. Following are just some of the classes either already completed, or planned for this year: Beginning Digital Photography, Baker's Dozen, Flower Photography, Action Photography, Sony Mirrorless camera mentoring, Landscape Photography, Photo Matting workshop, Expert help in specific cameras, and many more. Beth Schipper is the Chairperson for this committee with members Louise Stuart, Mike Bray, Ken Futura and George Harper.

If you have seen a camera club article in the Laguna Woods Globe or watched a video on Village TV about the Camera Club, or perhaps seen our Facebook page, this is all done faithfully by Joel Goldstein our publicity chairperson.

Larry Cunningham, our 1st Vice-President oversees the Membership and Hospitality committees, along with Photo Lab.

At the membership table during showcases and digital critiques, you are greeted by the friendly faces who also collect new member applications, dues and non-member fees for those attending the meeting. Arnold Silverman chairs the Membership committee and maintains the membership database with the help of the committee members Mike Kaizoji and Catherine Marra.

Each year we have a fabulous Year-end Dinner and Awards allowing the members to showcase their talents and enter into a little competition combined with a nice

social gathering. Different awards are given in multiple categories and culminating in the "Best of the Best." This once-a-year event is planned by the Hospitality committee whose job includes the advance set up of the venue and catering (great meals with hors d'oeuvres and libations) and securing a talented MC. The committee also provides the delicious light refreshments before our showcases. As for the images submitted by members for year-end competition, they are judged prior to the event by a panel of three judges then the Digital Critique chairperson collates them and creates a slideshow presentation to be shown at the event.

In conjunction with Clubhouse 4's Bonanza, the Camera Club hosted our own bonanza in the Photo Lab. Hours of work go into decorating the classroom with members' great artwork, securing volunteers to man the different tables and of course to act as cordial hosts/hostesses. Barbara Woolweaver has been a stalwart member heading this effort.

The Arts and Crafts Clubhouse (Clubhouse 4) includes the Photo Lab. The Camera Club volunteers to maintain the Photo Lab with the help of the GRF people and to provide supervisors to assist Village members with their photo printing, digitizing their slides and negatives, and with minor post-processing. This cannot be accomplished without our club volunteer supervisors and the Director of Supervisors Larry Cunningham. The gracious supervisors who give up their time By Rick Vettraino

and expertise are Peter Battin, Nelle Berner, Chung Li Ling, Russ Lazar, John Huber, John Lafferty, Stephen Speidel, and Larry Cunningham.

Our website is operated by Elaine Randolph. This requires updating all information on the site, managing our domain and putting up with the numerous requests from the officers to make updates and changes.

And finally our periodic digital newsletter Cameraderie in which you are reading this article, is created by Mary-Rose Hoang with the help of Bette Harper, Eleanor Oyen, Patricia Patti, Elaine Randolph, Mike Bray, and Joel Goldstein.

As you can see, it does take a village to run a club of our size that offers many functions and services to its members. Notice some members are involved in more than one committee by necessity and even more are working in the background without being mentioned here. Thank you for taking your time to read this and I hope to see you at one of our meetings or classes.
